

THE FESTIVAL SEASON'S APPROACHING!





With Easter in sight, Manx Music and Dance groups are getting themselves in shape for upcoming festivals. Two of the main festivals that are looming are **Cwlwm Celtaidd**, the Celtic Festival of Wales, which takes place in Porthcawl (26-29 March) and **Shennaghys Jiu** Celtic Youth Festival based in Ramsey (3-6 April).

Both festivals will feature top Manx acts alongside established and rising stars of the Celtic world. Cwlwm Celtaidd is fast establishing itself as one of the friendliest festivals committed to providing the total Celtic experience. Perree Bane and the Mollag Band are now regular performers at the festival, with newcomers The Reeling Stones appearing alongside fellow Manxies on the bill. Festival organisers hope that this, the 8th year of the festival, will be one of the best. All in all, the festival, situated on the seafront in South Wales' beautiful Heritage Coast, promises to be a great family weekend. A little closer to home, Shennaghys Jiu's focus is on providing a non-competitive environment for young performers from the Island, with guest musicians from other Celtic countries. The festival's ethos means that a wealth of young talent from the Island's schools are given the opportunity to perform alongside more established musicians and dancers. BREE FIDDLE WORKSHOP SATURDAY 21ST FEBRUARY 2009 PHILIP CHRISTIAN CENTRE, PEEL

On the first Saturday of the Spring half term, Bree will be holding a special workshop for young fiddle players. This event is open to current Bree participants and to other violinists in school years 6 to 11 who are interested in learning about traditional music.

One of Bree's expert tutors, Katie Lawrence, will be leading the fiddle workshop on Saturday 21st February at the Philip Christian Centre in Peel. Katie is a primary school teacher who also teaches fiddle and piano, and she has an MA in traditional music performance from the University of Limerick. She has performed Manx music from an early age and with her sister Kirsty on whistle, 'cello and piano, released a CD of traditional and original material called 'Three Baatyn Beggey' in 2006. She also plays with local folk-rock band The Ballaghs and Celtic group Sheear.

During the one-day fiddle workshop the students will explore traditional playing techniques using Manx music (including some of Katie's own tunes) and work on harmonies and arrangements to perform as a string ensemble. As a first event of its kind in the Isle of Man, Bree hopes that this fiddle ensemble may continue as an off-shoot of the umbrella group.





The workshop starts at 10am and concludes with a concert for family and friends at 3pm. The event is free of charge but students must register with Bree co-ordinator Chloë Woolley in advance (form at end of newsletter) and bring their own violin (i.e. fiddle!), music stand, Kiaull yn Theay books*, packed lunch and refreshments for the day. Under 16s must bring written permission from parents/guardians if they need to leave the building during the day.

Bree was established by the Manx Heritage Foundation in 2006 as an umbrella group of young musicians, singers and dancers interested in performing the Island's traditional music and using Manx Gaelic. It is currently open to secondary school age musicians but organisers hope to soon bridge the gap between primary and secondary education by including year 6 musicians. Since its inception, Bree members have met once a year for a weekend of educational workshops led by local Manx musicians, once a month for the informal music session currently based at Green's restaurant in Douglas and for other performances at community and charity events. New members are welcome to join the group at any time throughout the year and should contact Chloë or Breesha for more details.

Ballaugh-based musician and conductor, Paul Dunderdale is well-known for leading the IOM Wind Orchestra in its successes both on and off the Island. A former teacher at Castke Rushen High School and Ramsey Grammar, his music for school plays and arrangements for various bands and ensembles was always beautifully and cleverly written.

Whilst at CRHS, Paul started work on what came to be know as the 'Manannan' suite. Written for wind orchestra and based on Manx folksongs, the suite has been compared to Holst's writing. Fiona has worked tirelessly for the promotion of Manx language, music, dance and culture, since she came to the Island.

The leader of Bock Yuan Fannee dance group, she is in charge of teaching both adults and children. She sings in Manx Gaelic both as a soloist and as a member of Cliogaree Twoaie and has represented the Island at the Pan-Celtic Song Contest and at the Colmcille festival in Ireland. She is the Manx delegate for the Pan-Celtic Festival, organising the participation of Manx groups. For years, she was a hard-working volunteer on the committee of Yn Chruinnaght Inter-Celtic festival.

Fiona is still very active on the Manx scene, organising the annual Cruinnaght Aeg competitions for Manx music, song, dance and recitation – an important part of celebrating Manx culture within the schools.

Two research seminars from the University of Liverpool's Centre for Manx Studies concentrate on different aspects of Manx music. Both seminars are by PhD students studying at CMS and will take place on Tuesdays at 6pm at the IOM College, Rm K217.

Student of the Liszt Academy in Hungary, Christa McCartney, gave an inspiring update on her research to KMJ and CMS research students last month. Christa is currently studying for an MA, work for which has applied Kodaly's rules of analysis and application to Manx folksongs and tunes - we look forward to the results!
