The Island's iconic Celtic festival Yn Chruinnaght is not far off and we can EXCLUSIVELY reveal some of the fantastic acts and events coming to Peel from 16-20 July!!

YC 2014 is very much a family affair, bringing together far-flung cousins in a festival suitable for all ages. We can look forward to a visit from **Jamie Smith's MABON**, who won 'Best Group' in the 2014 Spiral Earth Awards - South Wales with strong Manx connections!

With family roots firmly entrenched in the Donegal Gaeltacht, traditional musicians **The Friel Sisters** - Anna, Sheila and Clare – though born and brought up in Glasgow, play a mixture of Irish music and song on fiddle, flute and uilleann pipes.

Breton brothers Eliaz and Meriadeg AKA **Ar Vreuder Lorho- Pasco** are a Biniou-Bombarde duo (Breton bagpipe and reeded instrument) whose parents used to come to Yn Chruinnaght in the 1980s, and they will give a recital and lead a fest noz dance night. We will also welcome **The Brim**, with Jamie Toms (guitar) and Alan Pengelly (accordion) accompanying dances for a Cornish ceili (troyl) called by Julian Whiting; and from Scotland, craftsperson **Ruth Black** will be exhibiting and teaching workshops in the Celtic knotwork embroidery as created by the company she runs with her mother and daughter at www.annamacneil.co.uk There will also be entertainment at a number of events from **Frankie & James**, a talented young fiddle and guitar duo based in the north of England.

Plus, as ever, friends from the fantastic body of top-class musicians and singers here in the Isle of Man, including internationally-renowned singer and guitarist, **Davy Knowles**, who is currently working on his *Island Bound* documentary, connecting the blues performer with traditional music roots.

The festival also celebrates the 150th anniversary of the famous Manx artist **Archibald Knox** (1864-1933) with a beautiful Knox-style logo specially designed by Nicola Dixon (above), a lecture by Yvonne Cresswell (see across for details) and several events that have been designed to coordinate with MNH's fantastic *Celtic Style* exhibition at the House of Manannan in Peel.

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Katherine Crowe: Tributes made to 'inspirational' singer

Hundreds of people have paid tribute to a "brave" and "inspirational" singer from the Isle of Man.

Katherine Crowe, 39, lost an eight-year battle with terminal breast cancer on Wednesday [7 May 2014].

Fellow performer Matt Creer, who recorded with Mrs Crowe, said she was "an unstoppable force of nature, both on and off stage".



Despite her illness, she made a bid for Christmas number one in 2012 with her version of Charlie Chaplin's Smile.

She recorded the song with the London Metropolitan Symphony Orchestra, at Abbey Road Studios, in London, and described the experience as a "dream come true."

The mother-of-two made music for more that 25 years, performing all over the island and in the UK.

Her husband Andy said his "beautiful, inspiring and perfect wife" had "slipped peacefully away" on Wednesday evening.

Close friend Christy DeHaven added: "Katherine was an utterly unique individual in her bravery, her humour, her talent, her wondrous stubbornness and her boundless generosity of spirit, even in the face of the most horrendous situations".

Youngsters from Culture Vannin's Manx music movement Bree spent an enjoyable afternoon last month 'workshopping' one of 3 commissioned pieces by Katie Lawrence. Designed with school ensembles in mind, local fiddler and teacher Katie arranged sets of Manx tunes in an exciting way suitable for inter-changeable instrumentation. Scored for fiddle, piano, tin whistle and 'cello, Bree tried out a set called "Two Ships – Creggyn – Mynor". The other sets arranged by Katie are "Bobbly – Tilly – Jiggy" and "Ginantonic - Sack - Sliack Lhiam jig". The pieces will soon become available to download for free.



Meanwhile, a Bree "supergroup" has been formed with a small selection of the long-term members who attend various secondary schools. Tutored by multi-instrumentalist Paul Rogers, the group will gather regularly to work on arrangements to perform in public. There are also pavilions featuring the work of local artisans, children's entertainment and lots of foodie treats! 
not a lot of pressure... For me it was the perfect opportunity to allow the kids to get up and perform for the first time!

Alan Franklin from the Manx National Heritage Library has alerted us to another gem from Manx music history. Composed 100 years ago, "Take me to the Camp upon the Hillside" tells of the famous Cunningham's Camp in Douglas.

('THE CUCKOO SONG')

The collecting of Manx song by Sophia Morrison remains to be fully researched. There is as yet not even a catalogue of the various song mss. to be found amongst her own papers as well as those that passed to Josephine Kermode, the Manx poet "Cushag." Reproduced below is "Car yn Cooag" ('The Cuckoo Song') to serve as an example of the richness of her collecting—see (2) for detail of the performance of the song recorded by her. In (3) she has copied onto the ms. a note from her correspondence (the writer is not recorded).

The Cuckoo Song. A Cradle Song is another song gleaned from a Dalby man. He remembers his grandmother an old woman of 80 at the time—who knew no word of English to the day of his death—singing it to him, 50 years ago or more, when he was a tiny child. When the old woman sang 'Kook, kook, peep, peep,' she rapped her knuckles here and there on the table. He seems to think that this couplet, all he can remember now, came as a refrain after each verse. It is such a quaint beautiful fragment one feels sorry there is not more of it.



The cuckoo at the beginning of the season sings in the "late" key—a minor third. – d:1: as the season goes on she sings a major third – m: d: later on she sings a little sharper than a major third—this is a diminished fourth. – fe: d: and at the end of the season a perfect fourth – f: d:'

MANX FOLK DANCE SOCIETY REUNION WITH THE WAYFARERS

On the morning of Friday 2nd May 2014, 12 members of the Manx Folk Dance Society (MFDS) flew to Birmingham, to be met by their friends in the Wayfarers Folk Dance Group, whom they were staying with for the Bank Holiday Weekend. They were taken to Cadbury World, where 2 more members of MFDS, in their camper, joined them. After some lunch, there was a very 'chocolaty' tour, which told the history of chocolate and the Cadbury family, along with free samples! There was a short tour of part of the factory, but there was not a lot to see. There was the chance to see some of the work done, with a demonstration of the old-fashioned method of making chocolates by hand. The tour ended in the Chocolate Shop, where many were tempted to spend some of their money! After an evening meal, there was the chance to catch up with more dancers and friends from the Wayfarers and the final 2 joined the MFDS (making a total of 16), having been for a Racing Car driving experience earlier in the day!! They met in a hall in the village of Studley for a general exchange of dances and some nibbles and chat.

The next day, they drove to Stratford upon Avon, where both groups danced for about one and a half hours in the new Fireman's Arena, which is dedicated to 4 local firemen who lost their lives in a fire nearby. This is near the Playhouse and the river. It was a very calm and gloriously sunny day, with many people in the area. After a picnic lunch, there was a trip on the river on a tour boat - it was all very tranquil! In the evening a meal was provided in the Coach & Horses Pub in Harvington, followed by an hilarious game of skittles - with 7 mixed teams of 5 players from both groups.

On Sunday, after a free morning, it was off to Baddesley Clinton to dance at this National Trust property. Both groups performed between 2pm and 4.30pm to an appreciative audience, with a short gap in the middle for refreshments. Again the weather was sunny and warm. Some of the Manx dancers took the opportunity to have a look around the lovely Manor House. Then it was on to the home of a couple of the Wayfarers for a barbecue meal followed by music and of course dancing! There was also an exchange of gifts - various chocolate goodies from Cadbury World for the MFDS and a book about the Isle of Man for the Wayfarers.

Monday was the final day for 9 of the Manx dancers, many of whom had a walking tour of

Birmingham in the morning, before heading out to the Airport for an afternoon flight back to the Island, in time to go back to work on Tuesday, after a wonderful weekend with old friends and fellow dancers. The other seven returned home over the next few days.

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Bunscoill Ghaelgagh wins Island of Culture category at Manx Folk Awards 2014

A multimedia presentation by Manx medium primary school Bunscoill Ghaelgagh has won the Manx Folk Awards 2014 special Island of Culture class.

This is the third year of the Manx Folk Awards – Aundyryn Kiaull yn Theay Vannin. They are hosted by the Department of Education and Children, Culture Vannin and Manx National Heritage to celebrate the Island's music, dance, poetry and song.



For Island of Culture 2014, each primary school was invited to enter a five minute multimedia presentation celebrating the Manx music, dance, song and drama that happens in their school. This was judged by the talented blues artist, and Island of Culture 2014 ambassador, Davy Knowles, who will now visit the winning school during the year.

Davy said: 'What a fantastic video from Bunscoill Ghaelgagh! They looked like they had so much fun making it. I can't wait to pay them a visit to meet them all, and hopefully they won't mind teaching me some Manx. Really brilliant, very well done to all involved.'

The winning video captured the pupils of Bunscoill Ghaelgagh showing what Manx culture means to them. This included Manx traditional songs as well as new songs in Manx composed by the teachers and pupils, one of which they filmed as a 'flash mob' in the yard at break time. They are shown enjoying Manx dancing, traditional arts and crafts, drama, storytelling and playing traditional tunes on a variety of instruments. The activities are introduced in Manx by pupil presenters and the film is subtitled for non-Manx speakers.

Davy, who hails from Port St Mary and went to Castle Rushen High School, has found fame as one of the world's most highly acclaimed young blues artists, and last year willingly accepted the Arts Council's invitation to be Island of Culture Ambassador.

As part of the Island of Culture, Davy will be producing a filmed documentary all about his Manx roots. Davy said:

'I have felt for a while that it is time to return to my Manx roots and explore the unique, fascinating history and stories behind beautiful Manx traditional songs with which I grew up. I want to capture the sounds, sights and rich culture of the Isle of Man, and also document my journey in discovering what was always at my feet growing up on the Island, but of which I took little notice. I look forward to visiting Bunscoill Ghaelgagh to share in the rich Manx culture and life that happens there.'
