

Public Meeting to be held to decide fate of national festival Thursday January 11, 7:30pm, Ramsey Town Hall

After a number of disappointments since the successful festival of 2006 Yn Chruinnaght has reached a turning point in its history. It either needs help or will have to fold entirely. December 28th saw a disappointing turn out at the Yn Chruinnaght Ghennal celebrations which included sets from Moot, The Mollag Band spin off Dog Breath and the Mothers of Melancholy, Kirsty and Katie and the Bock Yuan Fannee Whiteboys. As many usually avid Yn Chruinnaght supporters chose to stay in the pub and wait for the session afterwards it is becoming increasingly apparent that Yn Chruinnaght is no longer fulfilling the needs of the community of the Isle of Man. With a depleted committee, problems with accommodation and venues and an increase in cultural events generally it is now time to reassess the situation and find a new place in the Manx calendar for the festival. It is hoped that this meeting will encourage people with an interest in the festival to come forward and voice their views on the best way to proceed, ideas for the future and criticisms that can be learnt from. Yn Chruinnaght never was a festival only for music and dance, bu was designed to incorporate all elements of Manx culture, especially language, but also including dialect, art, crafts, sport etc. If you have any interest in these or related subjects and would like the opportunity to be heard please come along to the meeting. Song for Mann

As I'm sure most of you already know, Cooish saw the second annual Arrane son Mannin competition to decide the Manx offering at the annual pan celtic song competition. The competition is for original songs written in the native language of each Celtic country. The competition, between two entries, was stiff. The first, a song composed by Sharon Christian was performed by Claire and David Kilgalon and was a rousing sing with a distinctly traditional feel. The second song was written by Breesha Maddrell and performed by new duo Veih'n Chree. After much deliberation judges John Kilgallon, Bob Carswell and Eilin Begley decided that the song by Breesha Maddrell should go through to the competition to be held once again in Letterkenny, Ireland.

The song, Oirr ny Cruinney is a happy song of love and the memories of childhood. Breesha Maddrell is well known for her song writing skills, although not usually of such an upbeat nature. When asked Breesha told reporters that this was an

outlet for her more positive side. Veih'n Chree hope to continue their partnership with Breesha as they feel that her songs have a certain something often missing from the Manx vocal genre. The costumes worn by Veih'n Chree reflected the references to starlight and moonlight mentioned



in the lyrics and were no way influenced by the spoof Eurovision entry as seen on Father Ted. Veih'n Chree (Cinzia Curtis and Chloe Woolley) with vocals, piano and whistle follow in the footsteps of other Manx bands such as Skeaal, The Tholtan Builders and Cherles Guard. The competition is fierce in other countries with the Welsh heat broadcast on live television with a public phone vote to decide. All entries in the pan-Celtic competition are recorded live and published on a CD. Veih'n Chree will travel to Leterkenny in Ireland with King Chiaullee at Easter, 2007.
