ARRANE SON MANNIN WINNER

The Arrane son Mannin (Song for the IOM) competition was won by Fiona Cain and David Kilgallon with a song 'Bannaght son Mannin' (Salute to Mann) written by David Kelly and Tim Laycock, translated into Manx by Bob Carswell. The duo win £250 prize money, generously sponsored by the Manx Heritage Foundation, and will go on to represent the IOM in the pan-Celtic new song competition at the 37th Pan-Celtic Festival in Donegal Town in March 2008.

The competition was a tightly fought contest, with a great entry by the Reeling Stones called 'Er ny Creggyn' (On the rocks) which was about the wreck of the herring fleet. In the end, the three judges voted for 'Bannaght son Mannin' which praised the Island's landscape. Fiona Cain and David Kilgallon both sing with Cliogaree Twoaie, who will also represent the Island in choral competitions and concerts at the festival.

Even though it seems a long time to the 2009 competition, now's a good time to start thinking about any translations into Manx you may need – the more time you give Bobby Bob, the better – or to start writing your own songs in Manx. After a close second in the last competition, the Isle of Man's got to win one year!! All types of songs are eligible, but they must be in the native Celtic language of the country and must have featured in national competition prior to the Pan-Celtic. Bree Buskers raise £100 for Friends of Chernobyl's Children



Students and tutors from the Manx youth music group, Bree, gathered in Strand Shopping Centre, Douglas for a Christmas busking session last month (08/12/07). They raised £100 for the local charity, Friends of Chernobyl's Children, by playing Manx folk tunes and by singing well-known carols in Manx Gaelic. Norman Rivers from FOCC was delighted to receive the cheque and said that the donation would make a significant difference to helping bring Belarussian children over to the Isle of Man during the summer holidays. Plans for Bree members to host a Manx dancing ceili for the children are also being made.

Organised by Dr. Chloë Woolley (Manx Music Specialist) and Dr. Breesha Maddrell (Manx Music Development Officer) from the Manx Heritage Foundation, Bree is a collective for 11-18 year olds interested in performing Manx music and dance. The group currently includes students from all of the Island's secondary schools. A weekend of workshops is held each year in conjunction with Douglas Youth Centre, where students receive lessons in Manx music, dance and Gaelic from local experts. The group also meet informally once a month to play Manx folk tunes at a Saturday afternoon session. The session features Manx musicians, young and old, and the public are welcome to come along and listen. The next session will be at **Green's Restaurant** on January 12th 2008 from 3.30pm.

Much of the twopage article is devoted to detailed reviews of the CDs, likening King Chiaullee to innovative bands such as Shooglenifty and Lunasa, praising Katie

More than a foolish fortnight

Manx music and dance seemed to find its way into all kinds of places throughout December – all the usual carol services, Christmas concerts and parties, and even Pobble slipping off the stage at CRHS Christmas concert, as reported in the Island's press! The Skeealing Stones, aka The Reeling Stones [see picture] and Skeeal, played Bar Logo in Ramsey to a warm reception – River-dancing from the populace of Ramsey not withstanding! The Ballaghs were nobly supported by King Chiaullee in a packed Creek the night before Yn Chruinnaght Ghennal, with more and more original songs appearing, and Katie Lawrence dazzling everyone with her flashy fiddling. Although its main organiser Gráinne Joughin literally 'missed the boat', Perree T raised some funds with their fun-packed evening, 'Drive-Aid' whilst Cliogaree Twoaie treated the Ramsey pubs to some carols in Manx.

YN CHRUINNAGHT GHENNAL

Yn Chruinnaght's festive celebrations took the form of a ceili and open-mic session at the Corrin Hall in Peel on 29th December. The now infamous Purt h'Ninjas ceili band got the packed hall on their feet, dances interspersed with songs and tunes from the band and from the floor. With lots of new faces, it was a great occasion, helped by generous sponsorship from IOM Creameries. The evening also saw the 'Arrane son Mannin' competition (see separate report in this month's KMJ), which was won by Fiona Cain and David Kilgallon.

LAA ILLIAM DHONE

Wednesday 2 January saw the annual commemorations for Illiam Dhone, William Christian, who was shot in 1663. On what was a very blustery day, to say the least, Manx music featured not only in the session in the Viking in Castletown, but also throughout the church service, with hymns in Manx, two songs from just under ¼ of Caarjyn Cooidjagh and the solo 'Baase Illiam Dhone' (the death of Illiam Dhone) by Phil Gawne.

KIRK MICHAEL DIE'LL VERREE

All the traditional elements were present at this year's Oie'll Verree at Michael last week (05/01/07) – dancing from Ny Fennee, community singing, recitation and the infamous dialect plays – this time 'Jus' the shy', which was performed with much hilarity, bringing the curtain down (literally) and with it, the house. Caarjyn Cooidjagh sang Christmas songs in Manx and English, and Ny Fennee gave performances of the Girl's Jig and Gorse Sticks, as well as some instrumental numbers, most notably a harp solo of 'Tra va ruggit Chreest'.

Manx Studies in Poland

Manx Gaelic music and language have recently been the subject of study at Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznan, Poland.

During November 2007, Dr. George Broderick was the Erasmus Visiting Professor in Celtic Studies and on his visit to Poland he taught modules in Manx Gaelic, the Scottish Gaelic Bardic Tradition and Traditional Songs from Scotland, Ireland and the Isle of Man, Continental Celtic and Scottish Gaelic. Manx scholar Dr. Broderick is a professor at the University of Mannheim and has published many works on Manx culture and language.

The Polish students were particularly taken with the Celtic music and song and after the lectures, the 'craic' continued at the local student bar. A traditional music week is planned in March at the University of Poznan.

With a dissertation entitled 'Re-contextualising the tradition: commercial recordings of Manx traditional music', Russell Cowin of King Chiaullee fame graduated with an MA in



Manx Studies from the University of Liverpool in December. His 25,000 word dissertation looks at the role played by recordings of Manx music, and includes data collected from interviews with most of those who have made recordings over the years. Copies of his dissertation are available to read at the Centre for Manx Studies and in the Manx National Heritage Library, both on Kingswood Grove, Douglas.
