Manx language expert, singer and musician, Dr Brian Stowell will be awarded the Tynwald Honour on 5 July 2010

THE highest accolade Tynwald can bestow upon a member of the public is set to be awarded to Dr Brian Stowell on Tynwald Day. Brian is well-known as the first Manx Language Officer who spearheaded teaching in the Island's schools. He's also a talented singer and box player, Secretary to Yn Cheshaght Ghailckagh, Manx representative to the Celtic Congress, author and broadcaster and a volunteer member of many committees such as the Manx Heritage Foundation and the Gaelic Broadcasting Committee.

The honour is not made annually but only when someone of the right calibre has been identified - someone who has made an outstanding contribution to Manx life, most often outside of their normal employment and not just in the field of politics or government.

Brian's work for Manx culture is unparalleled and this honour is very well deserved by such a talented, generous and modest man. He continues to translate and publish work in Manx - including writing songs - and has been teaching and inspiring learners for decades. Brian's LP Arraneyn Beeal-Arrish is due to be re-issued as a CD later this year.

The talented line-up includes two home-grown musicians, Ruth Keggin and Karl Kramer, alongside fellow York music students Anna Goldbeck-Wood, Dave Pearce and Vanessa McWilliam.

Designed to coincide with Manx National Week celebrations, the quintet

will perform for pupils at Marown, Kewaigue, Arbory, Foxdale and Victoria Road schools, Bunscoill Ghaelgagh, Scoill Purt-le-Moirrey and Castle Rushen High School. Members of the public will also be able to hear them perform at the Yn Chruinnaght stand on Tynwald Day and at the Yn Chruinnaght Youth Concert on Saturday 10th July at 7.30pm, Scoill Ree Gorree in Ramsey (free admission).

The New Chronicles of Mann

Singers from fourteen primary schools and the Manx Children's Choir put on a spectacular show last weekend (Sat 26th June) at the Villa Marina when they performed the world premiere of 'The New Chronicles of Mann' by Lin Marsh.

Conducted by Head of the Music Service, Maggie Richardson, the massed choir performed a suite of brand new songs and poems based on the Island's landscape, history and folklore. Songs included 'The Moddey Dhoo', 'Steam Train', 'The Lady Isabella', 'Manannan's Cloak' and 'Ahoy me Lads'. Particular favourites with the audience were 'Strolling down the Prom' (with actions!) and the jazzy song 'Manx Cat' which both received an encore. Special guests included Young Singer of Mann 2008 winner Rachel Hopkinson who performed a solo on 'The Child with no Name', Geoff Corkish MHK as MC and John Kennaugh who recited poems about the Celtic calendar year and the TT. Composer and voice specialist Lin Marsh was delighted with the performance and commented on the superb quality of the young singers. Lin is a prolific composer of children's songs for TV and radio and she currently directs the National Youth Music Theatre. The work was commissioned on behalf of the Douglas Buxton Music Trust with sponsorship from the Manx Heritage Foundation and the Isle of Man Arts Council. There are future plans to create educational resources for schools so that the songs can be brought to a wider audience and become part of the musical repertoire of the Isle of Man.





Manx dancing down under! Glen Innes, NSW, Australia

Margaret Kenning sent this report and two photos to share with KMJ readers:

This year for the first time (to my knowledge) MANX Folk Dancing was performed in Australia and the Hunter Welsh Folk Dancers wish to thank Chloe Woolley from the Manx Heritage Foundation, Joan Cowell and Maureen Robinson from The Manx Folk Dance Society for their assistance. Without their help and expertise this event would not have taken place. We chose nine dances to learn which included duos, trios and a solo as well as group participation. The dances performed were Car ny Rankee, Daunse son Troor, Hyndaa yn Bwoailley, Cum yn Shenn Oanrey Cheh, Illiam y Thalhear, Eunyssagh Vona, Yn Mheillea, Helg yn Dreean and Hop tu Naa, with the last three also taught at workshops and at the Saturday night Ceilidh where everyone said how much they enjoyed dancing them. We all had a lot of fun and are looking forward to learning more dances to perform in future years.

A brief history of our group

Ten years ago in July 2000 The Hunter Welsh Folk Dancers was formed with a small group of interested people of all ages wishing to learn the graceful Traditional Folk Dances from Wales. It was not long before it was decided to perform at the Australian Celtic Festival held in Glen Innes NSW every year, where until we performed, there had only been various styles of Scottish & Irish Dance. Time to contact St Fagins Heritage Centre in Wales for traditional Welsh costume patterns and more music for new dances to learn and perform. The Welsh Dancing was so well received, we have performed there every year since. Each year a specific Celtic County is featured and so when it was coming up to "The year of the Cornish" we decided to learn some Cornish Dances and contact was made to The Cornish Folk Dance Society for music and instructions and sewing machines come out again to make costumes and Cornish Dancing was seen in Glen Innes for the first time. 2010 was proclaimed "The year of the Manx" so we decided we could not let this opportunity slip by without having Manx Folk Dancing performed. We also perform at Folk Festivals, Aged Care Hostels and Nursing Homes throughout Newcastle, Port Stephens, Central Coast and the Hunter, Sydney, Canberra and Nowra in NSW and in June this year are travelling interstate to Portarlington in Victoria for their National Celtic Festival.

Information on The Standing Stones at Glen Innes

The idea for the Stones started as an ambitious project to erect a National Monument to honour all Celtic peoples who helped pioneer





Australia in our 1988 Bicentenary Year. Submissions were sent to The Celtic Council of Australia and Glen Innes was chosen for their idea inspired by the Ring of Brodgar in Scotland's Orkneys. The Australian Standing Stones comprise 40 granite Monoliths and are unique in the Southern Hemisphere. Of these there is a circle of 24 stones representing 24 hours of the day, 3 Central Stones namely Australis Stone symbolising the link between the old & new worlds, the Gaelic Stone for Scotland, Ireland & Isle of Man and the Brythonic Stone for Wales, Cornwall & Brittany. There are also 5 Cardinal stones representing the stars of the Southern Cross and 7 stones marking summer & winter solstices, each stone averages 17 tonnes.

The first weekend (7th-8th) will be suitable for those with little or no Manx or for people who would like a refresher course.


The second weekend (14th-15th) will be suitable for those who know the basics and for those who are working towards being able to speak the language well.
