

IOMAC Manx Music Summer Season

After the success of last year's Manx music summer season it as been decided to continue this year. After a number of meetings with representatives of the groups. some changes have been made, but these are all improvements. Firstly, publicity has been upped. As a valued addition to the Villa's summer season it was seen as worthy of additional funds to promote Manx music as a an option for the Island's visitors. As a result posters and flyers will be distributed around the island, but the Steam Packet and coach tour operators are being targeted specifically. Also as a further addition, to help promote individual groups a programme will be printed, giving information about each band. They have been requested to pass this information onto the Arts Council themselves to ensure the information is correct in each case. Also, the equipment provided will be increased with collaboration between the bands and the Villa Marina sound technician staff who will provide suitable PA where necessary. One major difference will be the 7:30pm start time. This was decided on to avoid a cross over with events, such as the cabaret and this year, comedy club, that start in the promenade suite below at 8pm.

Yn Chruinnaght Schools Workshops


As part of Yn Chruinnaght's continuing commitment to education, this month will see the second, of what will hopefully be a regular, visit by a group of young musicians for schools workshops. With the changes in the format of the festival and the educational calendar, it became very difficult to ensure that workshops could take place during the main festival. It seemed unacceptable to allow these to fall by the wayside, so an alternative was developed.



As an education to both children on the Isle of Man and the visiting musicians, a group of students studying traditional music have been invited to carry out workshops over a week long period. Over the week it is hoped that the students will gain experience in teaching and working as ambassadors for their music, and the children will learn more of the relationship between Manx culture and the surrounding countries.

Last year saw a very successful week of workshops by students from the University of Limerick studying Irish traditional music and dance. This year three young ladies from Newcastle University will travel to the Isle of Man between the 17th and 23rd of June to carry out similar workshops. With fiddle, voice, piano and clog dancing, it is hoped that this group can educate people on the similarities between Manx and Celtic music and the music of Northern England and the Borders.

A record of schools that have been visited recently has been kept, and so schools that have not been visited for a while have been given first refusal. The visitors will have a hectic week travelling from Douglas, to Castletown, to Jurby and back to Douglas to complete the workshops. A special workshop for secondary school's folk groups has been organised also. This venture has been backed both financially and conceptually by the Department of Education, for which Yn Chruinnaght are very grateful. It hoped that this relationship between Yn Chruinnaght, the Department and off Island universities can carry on for many years to come

Yn Cruinnaght Aeg

There will be young people all over the Island revving up for this year's Cruinnaght Aeg competitions that begin this month. They began, way back when, as part of Yn Chruinnaght festival and many of the current organisers will remember fondly the days, sitting at Ramsey Grammar School and Auldyn, waiting their turn to compete. For those more ambitious students the logistics of managing to take part in simultaneous dance, music and song classes, trying to find your group/accompanist/duet partner and still managing to look calm when you played deserved a medal of its own.

However, as with most things, the competitions have changed and, with greater demand on them, grown. Now run by Manx National Heritage in collaboration with the Department of Education and Fiona McArdle, the competitions are now known as Cruinnaght Aeg ('youth gathering') and are held over two weeks in two locations. June 25th to 27th see voice, instrumental and dance competitions taking place in the South of Island, with a dat devoted to each type. The North get their turn (still at RGS) on 2nd to 4th July.

Although competitions, they are more of an opportunity to play with children from other schools and to work towards a performance for the end of the year. Skeeal travel to Iona and Mull



Skeeal are travelling to Iona and Mull at the end of TT week to take part in Fèill Chaluim Chille organised by Colmcille (www.colmcille.net). Colmcille was set up to promote a vibrant interactive Gaelic community between Ireland and Scotland, and, for its past few meetings in Belfast and Donegal, they have extended this to include the Isle of Man and Manx Gaelic.

The festival will feature traditional boats, ceili dancing, concerts and workshops. Gàidhlig Psalm Singers from the Isle of Lewis, Cór Árann & Cór Ban Inis Oírr from the Aran Islands and Cór Cuil Aodha from Cork will perform in Iona Abbey, and there will be a huge gig at Torosay Castle on Mull featuring Capercaillie, Kíla, Dàimh, Seamus Begley and Friends, and Aidan O' Rouke and Friends.

Skeeal will be performing and teaching workshops over the festival, island-hopping between Iona and Mull and Oban on the 'mainland'. They will be joined by Fiona McArdle, who will teach some dance workshops through Gaelic. The group will also offer language and singing workshops throughout their stay.

DVD of Manx groups

Filming of a DVD to promote Manx groups starts this month. As part of the Manx Heritage Foundation's continuing work to promote Manx music and dance both on and off the Island, the Foundation has agreed to fund the filming of a DVD to act as a showcase of Manx groups to send to festival organisers, agents, corporate conference organisers and those generally interested in Manx music and dance. Each group has been given the opportunity to take part, and have been given free reign to choose a venue that best suits their band for the filming. Each group will record two tracks and then be filmed playing along with the music to avoid the intrusion of mic stands, monitors and leads on the screen.

Eventually the DVD will be accompanied by a 'directory' of the groups including a biography and contact details for each group. There has been a steadily increasing flow in enquires both on and off the Island for Manx groups to take part in events, and it is hoped that this promotional material, alongside leaflets of general information and the Manx Music Database (www.manxheritagemusic.org) will help organisers pick the right group for their event. Each group will be given access to their own clip for their own promotional purposes aswell.
