Cohaglym Celtiagh Eddyrashoonagh International Celtic Congress 2010

The international meeting of the Celtic Congress will return to the Isle of Man this April. Organised by Dr Brian Stowell of the Manx branch, the conference will turn its attention to the theme of inter-Celtic communications. Delegates will be based at the Claremont Hotel on Loch Promenade in Douglas, with registration on Easter Monday 5th April. Anyone can book a place - email Brian on: bstowell@mcb.net

The week's programme includes a gala dinner and ceilidhs each night (all welcome), workshops in Manx song, lectures from all of the Celtic countries as well as excursions around the Island. There will also be an ecumenical service at Loch Promenade Methodist Centre on Thursday 8th April at 3pm featuring music from Caarjyn Cooidjagh. That evening there will be a young people's concert at 8pm, again at Loch Promenade Methodist Centre, featuring music from Beccy Hurst, Mike Boulton's groups and from the Bree trad youth music movement. The final evening features another concert at Loch Promenade at 8pm.

Visiting musicians and singers include South Uist's Sineag Nic an t-Saoir (MacIntyre), who won the Gold Medal at the Mod 2009 and who performed with Maggie MacInnes at last year's Cooish festival. Another familiar face is Máire Ní Choilm, a wonderful sean nos singer from Gweedore who enchanted Cooish audiences a few years ago. The musical riches don't stop there - they will be joined by Dublin harp player Brenda Ní Ríordáin, singer Moe Kease (Cornwall) and singer-songwriter Tecwyn Ifan (Wales).

In May we are dancing at the Australian Celtic Festival in Glen Innes, NSW (where the Australian Standing Stones are). 

SUCCESSFUL WORKSHOP WEEKEND

Around fifty people attended six workshops in Scottish traditional music, song and dance organised by the Manx Heritage Foundation at the beginning of February. Led by awardwinning performers Joy Dunlop and Rachel Hair, the workshops for adults included solo and choral singing in Scottish Gaelic, solo harp and harp accompaniment, step and ceilidh dancing. A special harp workshop for under 16s was also organised to meet the growing demand for harp tuition on the Island.

One of the great things about the weekend was that there was a real mix of people at the sessions – beginners and more experienced singers and dancers – which created a relaxed atmosphere. Songs taught included 'Buain a' Choirce' and 'Sìne Bhàn', whilst harp players picked up Calum Stewart's beautiful tune 'Looking at a rainbow through a dirty window'. The dance sessions were very well attended, with Joy testing the dancers with complicated step dance routines before moving to more relaxed mass ceilidh dances.

The workshop weekend concluded with a concert at the Studio Theatre, Ballakermeen, featuring members of The Reeling Stones and Ny Fennee dance group as well as performances from Joy and Rachel.

anx music roadshow with King Chiaullee

Last month, Manx instrumental group King Chiaullee and dancers John Kilgallon and Ali Carroon performed a two day tour of the Island's six secondary schools. Organised by Chloë for the Manx Heritage Foundation, the aim of each mini-concert was to complement the Key Stage 3 scheme of work on Manx music. In-between their lively sets which got all of the students and teachers clapping along, the lads described how they had originally formed the band at St. Ninian's High School 12 years ago, talked about their instruments, explained the difference between jigs and reels, and discussed how they learn tunes by ear and compose their own Manx music. The musicians and dancers got an enthusiastic reception from each of the schools, but at Ballakermeen High School, John's performance of Gorse Sticks received both an encore and standing ovation!
