Forget Glee... Bree is where it's at!

At the start of the October half term. youth movement Bree hosted its 5th annual weekend of Manx music, song, dance and now... drama! Two fun-filled days of playing, singing, composing, dancing, song-writing, acting, quizzes and dressing-up in comedy outfits concluded with a fantastic concert showcasing everyone's hard work! Around thirty students from different schools, ages and musical backgrounds came together at Douglas Youth Centre to work under the expert tutelage of the Bree tutors Clare Kilgallon, Matt Kelly, Luke Melvin, Breesha Maddrell, Katie Lawrence, Julie Matthews, Christa McCartney, Carol Hayes, David Kilgallon, Beccy Hurst and Chloë Woolley.

Over the weekend, the students were divided into four folk groups each tasked with writing a 5 minute set based around a 'lucky dip' tune which was to be performed in the Sunday afternoon concert. Je'h jyn as Chaarjyn incorporated the dance tune The Black and the Grey with Oikan ayns Bethlehem and The Chanter's Tune; Kelvin Mule and the Syntactic Charmers (spot the tutor name anagrams!) mixed The Green Gown with Car y Phoosee and Greensleeves translated into Manx; Grawp came up with an imaginative Harry Potter-themed set using Mannin Veg Veen; and The Manx Knobs performed a very Christmassy version of Moghrey mie as Maynrys mixed with Clinkeraght (Jingle Bells!)

Other highlights in the concert included a performance of Car y Phoosee by the Manx dancers, a lovely set by the whistle, flute and Northumbrian pipes group, an arrangement of one of Katie Lawrence's compositions by the fiddle class, and beautiful renditions of Mraane Kilkenny and St. Ninian's Prayer by the singing group. Composition tutors also performed their student's jigs, reels and airs which were penned over the weekend, and the song-writing class invented a hilarious new song called 'King Bwee' about The Simpsons (yes, the yellow headed ones!) set to the traditional Manx tune, C'red ta Shoh ta Jannoo Shiu?!

The main theme and grand finale of this year's Bree was 'Illiam y Thalhear', the Manx version of the well-known ballad William Taylor. The singing group opened up with verses sung in Manx Gaelic,

followed by the drama group who skilfully narrated and re-enacted the story of how Illiam y Thalhear's fiancée dressed up as a man to pursue him to sea... ending in deadly consequences! The dancers then performed the Manx dance, Illiam y Thalhear, which led into variations on the Manx tune performed by the different instrumental groups (including a Poirot version on the keyboard!) and concluding with the whole cast singing and playing the now unforgettable melody!!

Bree will be returning soon with a music session at Green's on Saturday 6th November (3 - 4.30pm), Christmas busking for charity and an appearance at the Manx Youth Choir's big concert in December. For details, contact Chloe Woolley (details at end of newsletter).



Feddan – update on Whistle lessons with the Primary Music Initiative

For the past month, selected year groups at Onchan, Peel Clothworkers', Laxey and Fairfield primary schools have been treated to tin whistle lessons. The 6 week course called 'Feddan' (Manx for whistle) is part of the Music Service's new Primary Music Initiative and gives the opportunity for each child to have a go at playing an instrument. The lessons are run by Chloë Woolley with a specially designed scheme of work, and so far activities have included playing and singing Manx tunes Bee dty Host and The Cormorant, playing in harmony as duets and as part of an ensemble, playing to

an accompaniment and learning important musical terms. It is hoped that some of the budding musicians (and their class teachers) will continue to play the whistle afterwards, perform for the rest of the school and take a further interest in Manx culture in the future.
