


REE NY MARREY RE-ISSUE

The Manx Heritage Foundation has just brought out a new edition of one of its bestselling music books. *Ree ny Marrey* is a collection of traditional Manx songs in both Manx and English with straightforward piano accompaniment and chords for guitar and keyboard. The songs have been chosen and arranged by Fenella Bazin, who has added new songs and rounds to go alongside stunning new illustrations by Manx artist, Juan Moore.

First published in 1994, *Ree ny Marrey*, which means 'king of the sea', has proved popular within the classroom as well as in the home. It contains old favourites like 'Ellan Vannin' and 'The Manx



Fishermen's Evening Hymn' as well as lots of songs in Manx which are easy to pick up. Translations and information about the songs are given, as well as links to internet resources where pronunciation guides will appear over coming months. Suggestions about ways to perform are also included – so the book is great for singing groups, choirs and churches, too.

IOM ARTS COUNCIL ANNOUNCES CHANGES TO FUNDING SCHEMES

In 2010 the Isle of Man Arts Council will be introducing some changes to how it considers funding applications from groups and individuals based on the Isle of Man.

The Arts Council currently offers funding under three main schemes. These schemes are designed to enable the Manx public to engage and participate in arts activities and to help artists, either individually or as a group. Bursaries are available for groups and individuals who are travelling to arts events, including educational arts events such as summer schools. Underwriting (a guarantee against loss) is available for amateur and professional events where the organisation managing the event may not be able to cover all costs themselves. Grants are available for events and requirements not covered by either of the above schemes, for example the purchase of equipment.

In the past, applications for funding have been accepted monthly for consideration by the Arts Council. Starting in 2010 applications will be accepted quarterly for consideration at the Arts Council meetings of 5th March 2010, 18th June 2010 and 1st October 2010. Applications must be received two weeks prior to the meeting date for which they are submitted for consideration.

Those groups and individuals who regularly apply to the Arts Council for funding will be contacted with further information about these changes. An advert will appear in the local press in January 2010 calling for any funding applications for the 2010/2011 financial year.

Joy Dunlop With talents ranging from singing to television presenting, dancing to award-winning Gaelic journalism, Joy Dunlop certainly has more strings to her bow than most. Born and raised in the rural village of Connel in Argyll, she was immersed in Gaelic culture from an early age which led her to graduate with an honours immersion degree in Gaelic Language and Culture from Sabhal Mòr Ostaig. A multi-prize winning Gaelic singer and popular international performer, she combines her full time work Gaelic development work for *An Comunn Gaidhealach* with a regular stints on Gaelic television and radio and also writes a monthly column for the Gaelic newspaper *An Gàidheal Ùr.* A trained ballet dancer and cèilidh dancing enthusiast from birth, Joy embraced Scottish step dancing in her early teens and in 2006 was crowned Traditional Interceltic Dance Champion at the International Pan Celtic Festival.

In 2009 Joy was runner up in the prestigious Gold Medal Series competitions after winning the Gold Medal Final competition and being runner up in the Òran Mòr competition.

Rachel Hair No stranger to the Isle of Man, Rachel enchanted a full cathedral at the 2009 Yn Chruinnaght. One of Scotland's finest players of the clarsach, the traditional harp, she was born and brought up in the Scottish Highland village of Ullapool and was first introduced to the harp at the age of 10. She graduated with a first class honours degree in Music from the BA Applied Music at the University of Strathclyde, where she was also awarded the Alexander Stone Prize for Outstanding Performance in her final solo honours recital.

Of mixed Gaelic heritage (her mother being from Ireland, her father from Scotland) Rachel has developed her own style of playing traditional music on the harp. Brought up in the Scottish Highlands but with Irish family roots, she has also been highly influenced by studying alongside folk, jazz, classical, funk, rock and pop musicians. Rachel has released two CDs to date: Hubcaps & Potholes (2006) and The Lucky Smile (2009)


